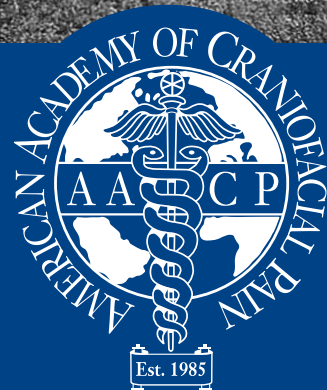

Distinguished Speakers



REDA A. ABDEL-FATTAH, BDS, MS, MPS, is a practicing dentist in Boca Raton, FL. He emphasizes evaluation and management of orofacial pain and TMJ disorders. In addition to his dental education, Dr. Abdel-Fattah completed two master's degrees. The first is in materials science and engineering with emphasis on biomaterials; the second is in professional studies with a concentration in biomechanical trauma. Named as an expert by plaintiffs and defendants in numerous TMJ injury cases, Dr. Abdel-Fattah is a sought-after lecturer and the author of many articles and books. A member of the Academy since 1987, he is a Fellow of the ACCP and a Diplomate of the American Board of Craniofacial Pain.



JAY W. GERBER, DDS, is Founder of the Center for Occlusal Studies and now serves as its clinical & educational director. Board-certified in pain management, Dr. Gerber maintains a medical/dental staff position at the Camden Clark Memorial Hospital in Parkersburg, WV, and is Director of Neuromuscular Orthodontics at LVI Global in Las Vegas, NV. Recognized as one of the early innovators of neuromuscular functional orthodontics and applications of the 'EMG Guided' bite registrations for occlusal disorders, Dr. Gerber has clinically treated thousands of patients in his private practice. He is one of a select few certified Senior Instructors for the International Association for Orthodontics and has been a member of ACCP since 1992.



ROBERT JANKELSON, DDS, graduated from the University of Washington School of Dentistry in 1963. From 1963 through 1990, he maintained a private practice in Seattle, WA, with emphasis on craniomandibular dysfunction and prosthetics. Today, Dr. Jankelson is a principal lecturer on occlusion at the Las Vegas Institute for Advanced Dental Studies. He is also the author of the definitive text, *Neuromuscular Dental Diagnosis & Treatment in Clinical Dentistry*, plus numerous scientific articles. His credentials include Fellow of the International College of Dentists and the International College of Craniomandibular Orthopedics. Continuing the work of his father, Dr. Bernard Jankelson, in research he is recognized as a principal developer of the clinical use of electromyography in dentistry.



GIORA PILLAR, MD, PhD, is head of the sleep laboratory at Rambam Medical Center. He is also an associate professor in the Faculty of Medicine, Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, Haifa, Israel. Dr. Pillar received his medical and scientific degree from the Technion and thereafter completed fellowships at the Sleep Medicine, Endocrinology & Circadian Rhythm Department, Brigham & Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School. He is the author of *Sleep Disorders: Diagnosis, Management & Treatment — A Handbook for Clinicians* plus over 70 papers, which have been published in peer-reviewed journals.



MARC R. PRITZKER, MD, is Professor of Medicine in the Cardiovascular Division at the University of Minnesota. Dr. Pritzker earned his MD degree from the University of Minnesota and is board certified by the National Board of Medical Examiners; the American Board of Internal Medicine; and the American Board of Internal Medicine, Cardiovascular Diseases. The author of numerous scientific abstracts and articles, Dr. Pritzker is a Fellow of the American College of Cardiology, the American College of Chest Physicians, and the American Heart Association. He is also President of Life Sciences, Inc.

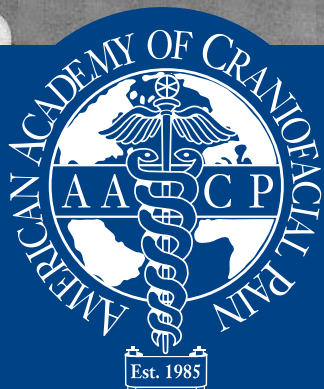

8:15 am	ROBERT JANKELSON, DDS <i>The Scientific & Clinical Basis of Neuromuscular Occlusion</i> When is occlusion important in evaluation of the TMD patient? Always! Patient health and well-being is a continuous interplay between adverse pathologic stressors and the patient's accommodative (adaptive) mechanisms. Pathology and symptoms can occur when the stressors exceed the adaptive capacity of the patient. Malposition of the mandible to the cranium and pathologic signaling from occlusal prematurities are major contributors to signs and symptoms of TMD. The relationship between muscle, teeth and joints will be clearly defined. The scientific basis and clinical techniques of neuromuscular dentistry are designed to minimize occlusal stress and the need for muscle accommodation. The occlusal diagnostic and treatment protocols that assure optimal restoration of postural integrity, muscle health, and TMJ health will be demonstrated. Upon completion, attendees should: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Appreciate the importance of restoring general postural integrity, optimizing muscle function and restoring joint relationships during phase I provisional diagnosis and treatment prior to phase II definitive restoration.2. Understand the use of TENS, EMG, ESG and computerized jaw tracking during diagnosis and treatment.3. Define the role of occlusal management in treatment of the TMD patient.4. Outline clear guidelines for occlusal equilibration versus occlusal orthosis therapy.

1:30 pm	JAY W. GERBER, DDS <i>Orthodontic & Prosthodontic Case Finishing</i> Discover the secrets to stable neuromuscular occlusion! While everyone today seems to have a "new" technique for finishing, Dr. Gerber will share time-tested "keys" to successful long-term occlusal stability that you may use immediately in your practice. In the process, he will illustrate the steps that he has used to treat orofacial pain patients for nearly thirty years. Discussion of cases treated with neuromuscular orthodontics and finished using orthodontics, fixed and removable prosthetics will be included. Upon completion, attendees should: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Recognize the importance of correct jaw positioning to achieve neuromuscular balance.2. Realize why relapse has burdened orthodontics for years.3. Enhance their knowledge of progressive treatment steps to achieve neuromuscular balance.4. 8:00 am	REDA A. ABDEL-FATTAH, BDS, MS, MPS <i>Medicolegal Considerations in Management of Temporomandibular Injury Cases</i> Managing TMJ injury cases requires medical as well as legal knowledge. This presentation offers considerations in taking an adequate history and performing a thorough evaluation of these injury cases. In addition, selecting and ordering applicable diagnostic records and their interpretation will be stated. Managing the administrative legal aspect of the case, such as writing an effective report, rating permanent impairment and explaining the mechanism of injury, will also be presented. Upon completion, attendees should: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Enhance their understanding of how to perform an adequate clinical examination, including a specific health history and history of the injury.2. Improve their ability to select and order appropriate testing for an injury case, and formulate a specific diagnosis.3. Increase their skills in writing effective injury case reports that include explanation of the mechanism of injury, permanent impairment rating, future care listing and defense when necessary.

10:30 am	GIORA PILLAR, MD, PhD <i>Obstructive Sleep Apnea: Overview & New Insights into the Pathophysiology & Complications</i> Extensive research during the recent decade has led to a better understanding of the pathophysiology of OSA syndrome, pointing out the combination of anatomical and physiological factors. Untreated OSA is associated with complications predominantly secondary to daytime sleepiness, endothelial dysfunction, increased oxidative stress and inflammation. Traditional treatment is based predominantly on CPAP, but there is emerging evidence for great success and the importance of dental treatment as well. Upon completion, attendees should: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Understand the pathophysiology of OSA.2. Identify various mechanisms leading to potential complications.3. Recognize advantages and disadvantages of various treatments for OSA.

2:00 pm	MARC R. PRITZKER, MD <i>Sleep & the Heart</i> Dr. Pritzker will discuss the intimate association between various forms of cardiovascular disease and sleep-disordered breathing. In addition, attendees will become familiar with the most recent theories regarding the evolution of vascular disease – the “common ground” hypothesis – that links diverse forms of cardiovascular disease to common pathologic mechanisms. Upon completion, attendees should: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Identify various forms of sleep-disordered breathing.2. Identify disease states that may be caused or affected by sleep-disordered breathing.3. Identify various management strategies for vascular manifestations of sleep-disordered breathing.
